Promptly at 10.30am Tony Stimson, our new Chairman, welcomed everyone to the start of the museum's 25th anniversary year and invited Nigel Johnson (Chairman of the local group of HIWWT) to cut appropriately coloured green and blue ribbons to signify the start of our 2013 exhibition year.



Through a mixture of film, images artefacts and artwork this exhibition highlights some of the wonders of the Solent and challenges us all to look again at the local seashore.



We all know that seals can often be seen in Chichester Harbour but did you know that seahorses also live in the Solent and that a prehistoric settlement has been found beneath its waters?



The display includes beautiful pictures of marine creatures,



seagrasses and shells and tells us about the local recommended marine protected areas and what the sea does for us.

TALKS

5+1 Extending the Senses. 21st January 2013

On a cold snowy evening we were heartened to have an audience of 38 people attend this illustrated talk by Laurie Booth about dowsing. Laurie Booth described dowsing as not a gift but an adventure of the mind since one must believe for it to work. He talked about the occasions where dowsing may be used not only for

water divining but in searching for tunnels, pathways and buildings. Locally he talked of six Iron Age huts in the area of Brook Meadow and paths leading to Kings Road.

Laurie Booth is a member of the British Society of Dowsers and was happy to answer numerous questions and demonstrate the techniques. The audience were invited to dowse for a farm building beneath the floor in the Mountfield Room many with apparent success.

The River Ems

The slide presentation by Mike Edwards on 25th February proved more popular than anticipated. Mike commented that he wasn't sure whether it was the speaker or the subject that had proved the attraction...

Mike Edwards is a retired and well known photographer in Emsworth. He traced the apparent source of the Ems showing slides of the river in flood and tracing its flow with several tributaries down to the Slipper Mill Pond.

Excellent colour slides were shown and Mike paid tribute to David Rudkin who helped him in the early days with this project. "The River Ems" book by David J Rudkin is available at the Museum and fifteen copies were sold on the evening. 112 people attended, 60 EMHT members and 52 non members. Tony Stimson tried to survey people to learn where they remembered hearing or seeing publicity for the talk. The results are available in tabulated form. Although he was swamped by the numbers we are obtaining useful information, especially about non members.

Annual General Meeting

The 38th Annual General Meeting of the Trust was held on Monday 18th March – with the first part of the evening taken up with reports on the Trust's finances and details of activities in 2012 as well as plans for 2013. The minutes will be distributed with the November 2013 edition of the Emsworth Echo.

The appointments and elections listed on the agenda were approved unanimously - Tony Stimson is our new Chairman and Sylvia Courtnage has joined the committee. Wendy Bright and Dorothy Bone were reelected and Andrew Bloxham will be the Independent Examiner of Trust accounts at the year end.

Havant Borough Council's appointment of Cllr Richard Galloway as their representative on the General Committee of the Trust was ratified.



Later, three of the students who are helping to make the film based on Strahan Soames' 1940 diary told us about the progress they have made. This was done in the form of an interview with Alison Beckett the Publicity Officer for Chichester Harbour Conservancy. The students obviously enjoy working on this project and members present were pleased to be able to ask questions and join in their enthusiasm. The photograph shows the 3 students wearing their specially designed T- shirts with the logo Soames War. The film will be premiered at The Spring in Havant in May and will also be shown at the Emsworth Sailing Club on 20th June as well as being used as an education tool by Chichester Harbour Conservancy. Dear members,

However, I am keen to learn, can cope with hard work and, occasionally, I don't mind getting my hands dirty as you may have noticed from the front page of the February Newsletter. I will also continue stewarding from time to time.

Chairman's Address

When I was invited to stand for election as Chairman I thought long and hard. My time on the Committee has given me confidence in the capable, committed and hard working members who already serve the Trust and the Museum, some as elected members of the Committee, some as co-opted members and also the many volunteers who support us in various ways such as editor of the Newsletters, organisers of the Stewards duty rotas, the Stewards and the deliverers of Newsletters, etc., to mention just some. As a result, I felt I would have good support in my role as Chairman and hence I was pleased to accept the nomination.

With your help, I aim to make a positive contribution to the development and wellbeing of the Trust and the Museum.

Over winter we have redecorated the entrance lobby, staircase and reception area of the Museum, and have re-arranged some of the picture exhibits. The next project is to redecorate the main exhibition hall, following which it is planned to make significant changes to the exhibits to enhance the story of the history of Emsworth and its people.

These projects are necessarily dependent upon our resources both financial and in the number of volunteers available to help with some of the work.

This brings me to the current matter of our subscriptions. To succeed in our development plans, we must first improve our base line regular income by increasing subscriptions. Members were advised at the AGM just passed and at the AGM in March 2012 that subscriptions would be reviewed.

Proposed Increase in Subscription Rates for 2014

For the following reasons there is now a need to increase our subscription rates for the first time in 12 years: Stationary, postage, electricity and other costs have risen rapidly.

Our income has remained static.

We can no longer rely on interest on deposits.

This is despite the careful management of expenditure and the best efforts of our volunteers to raise funds and hand deliver the Newsletters and Echo wherever possible.

Members will recall that during the last two Annual General Meetings a rise in subscription rates was discussed and also the possibility was raised of merging the rates for under and over 65s. Since the AGM the General Committee has now recommended the following subscription levels for 2014:

Single £9
Joint* £16

The new rates represent an increase of approximately 60% since they were last raised in 2000, which is comparable to the rise in the cost of living since then. In order to gain Trust members approval for the proposed rise it is intended to hold a postal vote for all fully paid up members at the end of May 2013.

Subscription rates for Life Membership are being considered by the General Committee and will be published in the near future. Accordingly, no new applications for Life Membership will be accepted until January 2014.

You will be able to see Jan Copsey's attractive acrylic and watercolour paintings of flowers, trees and scenes of the area.








Chris Abel will be showing his wonderful handcrafted jewellery, wall art and gifts made from art glass and re-cycled glass.

It is being hosted by the Brookfield Hotel and includes a multimedia presentation "Echo of Oysters" with over 500 photographs comparing the oyster industry locations as they are today with historic images.

It's Only a Laundry Basket but . . .



... it reminded me that, when we came to Emsworth in the mid 60's the Emsworth Havant and District Steam Laundry was still operating in New Brighton Road though it closed soon after. The basket was recently donated by Mrs Fisher of Mychett near Camberley. Mrs Fisher had bought the basket at an auction, and had no details of its history.

She initially offered the basket to the Watercress Line (where she had seen a similar basket being used as a prop) and they suggested our Museum.

Margaret Rogers then arranged for her son to collect it for us.

It had signs of woodworm when it arrived but we treated it as a precaution and it is now on display as a toybox. The 1911 Census showed that laundry was a thriving business in Emsworth, with two commercial laundries employing over 50 people. These were mainly women but some men were also employed as engineers, labourers and carriers.

Many women also worked from home and took in washing.

The Emsworth Steam Laundry was clearly an important component of Emsworth life but, surprisingly, we have very little information in the Museum. However, there must be many Emsworthians who could tell us what it was like.

Did you, or a friend or relative, work there? Have you any photographs of the laundry or its employees? Have you any memorabilia, such as laundry price lists which might form the basis of an future exhibition? If you have any information, we would love to hear from you.
